### SCHOOL GOAL 1

By March 2026, there will be an increase in percentage of students who feel that staff care about them in the EIPS and Alberta Education assurance surveys.

#### **Related Division Goals**

• Priority 2, Goal 2: Enhance High-Quality Learning and Working Environments; Positive Learning and Working Environments.

### **Strategy**

- Encourage and coach staff on intentionally connecting and building relationships with students (i.e., all staff will greet students at the door whenever possible; model respectful and empathetic behaviour; establish clear routines and procedures)
- Prioritize mental health and students' overall sense of safety in the school
- Foster a sense of community student host club, retreats, chapels, shared devotions
- Create a welcoming environment in the school
- Provide notecards for each teacher to give encouraging/uplifting notes to students and give teachers time to complete them.
- Staff participation in student athletics, band, musical theatre, and other events
- Promote access to student Bible studies and other clubs (youth drop-in, workout times, TAVO, and other clubs)
- Utilize Collaborative Team Meetings to intentionally collaborate on building community in our school

#### **Related Division Goals**

• Priority 2, Goal 1: Enhance High-Quality Learning and Working Environments; A Culture of Excellence and Accountability.

### **Strategy**

- Incorporation of dedicated literacy time into Junior High Health classes (20-minute literacy focus each class)
- PD for teachers on incorporating literacy into various classes
- Real-world application of literacy skills in all classes (teaching students functional writing skills (emails, directions, etc), how to read recipes, instructions manuals, mathematic equations, etc)
- Tiered reading intervention program for students below grade level as identified by reading tests
- Increase classroom libraries in more classes and across different subject areas
- Collaborative Team Meetings literacy implementation across each grade level

### **Strategy**

- Incorporate 'soft skills' into teaching (interview skills, problem solving, work ethic, punctuality, assignment completion, conversation skills, employability) into core subjects; provide messaging to students that tells them how important these
- Expose students to inspirational examples of KSAs in action (real-world application of knowledge)
- Continuation of Community Kitchen class providing students with the opportunity to engage in hands-on participation with local community service providers
- Funding provided for a service project in each Jr. High CS&L class.
